Business review

The Company has delivered another strong year with turnover increasing to £19.4m from £17.2m in 2018.

The Apprenticeship side of the Group underwent a significant market change led by central government reforms. These reforms have led to a significant shift with changing pricing and a move from delivering frameworks to standards. This move to standards has been essential in ensuring Babington continues to effectively deliver to meet the needs of stakeholders.

The Company supported over 10,000 learners in year; helping to change their lives by either finding them employment and or supporting them in achieving their qualification. All of this would not be possible without our talented and dedicated staff. We have this year invested in many areas that support them further; commencing the upgrading many of the learner systems and providing them with high quality equipment to continue to offer the excellent quality service.

Babington continues to be committed to conduct its business in the best interests of all the learners, staff, employers and funders and other key stakeholders who continue to support Babington.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Company is heavily invested in the delivery of various Government funded Skills and job outcome programmes. As such the Company has to be aware of changes in Government policies, priorities and funding availability and be prepared to adapt our approaches to skills and employability accordingly.

Financial key performance indicators

We consider that our key financial performance indicators are those that communicate the financial performance and strength of the Company as a whole, these being turnover, EBITDA and cash flow.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2019

1. General information

The Company is a limited company and is incorporated in England and Wales and details of its registered office are set out in the company information page.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The Company's functional and presentational is £ sterling. The financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgment in applying the Company's accounting policies (see note 3).

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

2.2 Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland":

- the requirements of Section 4 Statement of Financial Position paragraph 4.12(a)(iv);
- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirements of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

This information is included in the consolidated financial statements of Project Sinatra Topco Limited as at 31 July 2019 and these financial statements may be obtained from Companies House..

2.3 Exemption from preparing consolidated financial statements

The Company is a parent Company that is also a subsidiary included in the consolidated financial statements of its immediate parent undertaking established under the law of an EEA state and is therefore exempt from the requirement to prepare consolidated financial statements under section 400 of the Companies Act 2006.

2.4 Going concern

The Company has given an unlimited guarantee to secure the bank borrowings of other companies within the Group. At 31 July 2019, group borrowings amounted to £5,350,000 (2018: £6,000,000). The Company is also party to an inter creditor deed, which provides a guarantee, subordinated to the bank borrowings, to secure loan notes of £18,492,130 (2018: £15,460,380).

As noted in the accounts of the ultimate parent undertaking, the Group had net liabilities of £12,735,814 and net current assets of £1,063,382 (2018: £8,176,562 and £3,729,232). During the year the net senior leverage covenant was breached, subsequent to which the covenants were renegotiated.

Group forecasts through to 31 January 2021 show all covenants being met. The Group's principal banker ("The Bank"), has considered the forecasts and indicated their satisfaction with them.

Further, the Bank have confirmed that quarterly loan repayments of £200,000 per quarter can be reduced to £50,000 per quarter until the end of April 2020, rising to £275,000 at end July 2020 and £325,000 thereafter. These changes have ensured that the capital repayments are more aligned to the additional revenues forecast for the year ended 31 July 2021 and result in an overall increase in forecast headroom of £100,000 to the end of July 2021.

During the year additional loan notes totalling £2,500,000 were issued with the same interest terms as the original loan notes. The new notes rank in preference to the original notes and interest is due on them on 30 June and 31 December. Also during the year the terms of loan notes totalling £15,460,380 were amended such that all accumulated but unpaid interest (totalling £6,104,587) was capitalised as new loan notes, with interest rates and repayments as per the original loan notes.

The holders of all of the loan notes have confirmed that they will continue to provide support to the Group by not seeking payment of any interest falling due on all loan notes until the earlier of:

- ii) the bank or any other secured creditor taking enforcement action against the Group;
- ii) such time that all other liabilities of the Group can be repaid in full as they fall due; and
- iii) 31 January 2021.

The directors have drawn up an operational improvement plan was drawn up to enhance the underlying strength of the business and to improve the overall trading performance of the Group going forward. The forecast, prepared on the basis of the improvement plan, shows a significant improvement in the Group's EBITDA going forward.

On the basis of the improved performance indicated by the forecasts and actions undertaken as reported above, the directors consider that they have a reasonable expectation that the Group has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and to meet its current liabilities as they fall due.

The Group and Company therefore continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

2.5 Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts, rebates, value added tax and other sales taxes. The following criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

Rendering of services

Revenue from a contract to provide services is recognised in the period in which the services are provided in accordance with the stage of completion of the contract when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- the amount of revenue can be measured reliably;
- it is probable that the Company will receive the consideration due under the contract;
- the stage of completion of the contract at the end of the reporting period can be measured reliably; and
- the costs incurred and the costs to complete the contract can be measured reliably.

2.6 Operating leases: the Company as lessee

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of comprehensive income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

2.7 Leased assets: the Company as lessee

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts and finance leases are capitalised as tangible fixed assets. Assets acquired by finance lease are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives. Assets acquired by hire purchase are depreciated over their useful lives. Finance leases are those where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership are assumed by the company. Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors net of the finance charge allocated to future periods. The finance element of the rental payment is charged to the Statement of comprehensive income so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge on the net obligation outstanding in each period.

2.8 Research and development

In the research phase of an internal project it is not possible to demonstrate that the project will generate future economic benefits and hence all expenditure on research shall be recognised as an expense when it is incurred. Intangible assets are recognised from the development phase of a project if and only if certain specific criteria are met in order to demonstrate the asset will generate probable future economic benefits and that its cost can be reliably measured. The capitalised development costs are subsequently amortised on a straight line basis over their useful economic lives, which range from 3 to 6 years.

If it is not possible to distinguish between the research phase and the development phase of an internal project, the expenditure is treated as if it were all incurred in the research phase only.

2.9 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to the Statement of comprehensive income over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

2.10 Pensions

Defined contribution pension plan

The Company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the Company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in the Statement of comprehensive income when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the Company in independently administered funds.

2.11 Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Statement of comprehensive income, except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the Balance sheet date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

2.12 Exceptional items

Exceptional items are transactions that fall within the ordinary activities of the Company but are presented separately due to their size or incidence.

2.13 Intangible assets

Goodwill

Goodwill represents the difference between amounts paid on the cost of a business combination and the acquirer's interest in the fair value of its identifiable assets and liabilities of the acquiree at the date of acquisition. Subsequent to initial recognition, goodwill is measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses. Goodwill is amortised on a straight line basis to the Statement of comprehensive income over its useful economic life.

Other intangible assets

Intangible assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, intangible assets are measured at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses.

All intangible assets are considered to have a finite useful life. If a reliable estimate of the useful life cannot be made, the useful life shall not exceed ten years.

Amortisation is provided on the following bases:

Development expenditure	-	% 20-33 straight line
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2.14 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Leasehold improvements	-	10%
Fixtures and fittings	-	20%
Computer equipment	-	33%

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the Statement of comprehensive income.

2.15 Valuation of investments

Investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost less accumulated impairment.

2.16 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment.

2.17 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours.

2.18 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.19 Financial instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate of the recoverable amount, which is an approximation of the amount that the Company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the balance sheet date.

3. Judgments in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The key areas of judgment relate to revenue recognition and the useful economic lives of tangible and intangible fixed assets:

Revenue recognition

The Company recognises revenue when services have been provided and contract conditions have been met in relation to these services. Therefore, the Company make a provision against revenue for instances where funding has to be returned to the ESFA when certain conditions are not met. The Company also recognises amounts recoverable in relation to contracts, which are on going at the year end, taking into account the anticipated success rate.

Useful economic lives of fixed assets

The annual charges for depreciation and amortisation of tangible and intangible fixed assets are sensitive to changes in the estimated economic useful lives of the asset. These are re-assessed annually and amended when necessary to reflect any changes arising from economic utilisation, future investments and their physical condition.
